Her most recent book, <i>Inklings of Democracy in China</i>, has just been published by Harvard University's Asia Center. Professor Ogden is also the author of <i>China's Unresolved Issues: Politics, Development and Culture</i> (Prentice Hall, 3rd edition published in 1995); as well as <i>Global Studies: China</i>, (McGraw Hill, 2001), now in its 9th edition.</p> <p>The main focus of Professor Ogden's professional work has been the relationship between culture, development, politics, and democratization. She travels regularly to the People's Republic of China, and has also done research and study in Taiwan and Hong Kong. In 2001, she accompanied former President Jimmy Carter to monitor an election in a Chinese village outside of Shanghai.</p> |
