Lessons from Newport

[Editor's note: As part of practicing what we preach, every year NEAIR asks Conference participants to fill out an evaluation of the Conference. The information gathered from the evaluation informs the planning for future Conferences. NEAIR is most grateful to Meihua Zhai for all the work she did in preparing the survey instruments, crunching the data, and writing up the evaluation report. The following is a summary of highlights from the evaluation.]

The Newport conference was a big success. It was one of the top four highest rated conferences in terms of overall quality in the past 12 years. The other three were the conferences in 1998, 1995 and 1994.

The two areas that were recommended to be strengthened in 1998 ("helped me develop new skills and technology" and "showcased effective use of technologies"), received their highest ratings since 1988.

The mean satisfaction ratings for all items referring to the conference's professional development components, were the highest since 1988: helping the attendees establish personal and professional contacts; giving new ideas on better ways to the job; giving new ideas to bring home and share; helping renew enthusiasm; addressing the latest develop-

ments in IR, and showcasing the effective use of new technology.

Newcomers' orientation, conference organization and local arrangements received the highest ratings for both quality and usefulness this year.

Many of the suggestions from the membership for next year's Conference were focused on skill development (the use of statistics, statistical software packages, database management, data warehousing, Web site construction) and the changes in IPEDS reporting.

NEAIR members would prefer better coffee and soft music at dinnertime.

of conducting innovative research on topics that would be of interest to the IR community in the Northeast. The second type of grant is a *conference grant* (\$800 maximum) to help members attend conferences that would be beneficial to their professional development but fall outside the realm of traditional conferences

that they might attend.
