The Museum of Art has curated an exhibition that focuses on the essence of our role on campus: to support the academic mission of Bates.

PEDAGOGY

Sample assignment for any discipline: Index card reflection

Have students look for a designated time on their own and write down on their index card a question, an observation, a connection to class based on one piece of art in the exhibition. Then ask them to exchange cards, pair-share, or facilitate a group discussion in the gallery or post-visit in class. See how many made similar comments. They can also be useful for reflective writing that you can collect as a means of assessment. This is a great way to get students thinking and reflecting about your class topics in a novel manner.

Give your class a GIFT!

Looking for a way to gather meaningful and honest feedback from your students?

Approaching the mid-semester mark is a great time to find out from your students how the class is going so far. CITL can perform a non-evaluative midterm focus group for you as a neutral third party, collecting anonymous feedback and curating the report back to you.

Group Instructional Feedback Technique (GIFT)

This technique has been empirically tied to higher student satisfaction as measured by students' perception of the course, the instructor, and their motivation towards learning (Mauger, 2010; Gray and DiLoreto, 2016). GIFT allows students to feel heard, allows you to receive constructive suggestions mid-semester allows time for educator adaptation, until waiting until the end of the semester. Examining your teaching through the student lens is an important reflective practice.

How does it work?

You request a GIFT from CITL tol schedule 20-30 minutes of class time for CITL to lead a focus group. Students are encouraged to create constructive feedback using open ended questions in small groups and then in a full group discussion to reach consensus, all facilitated by CITL staff. Discussions and analyzed feedback are kept confidential between the instructor and the CITL facilitator.
