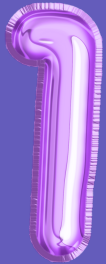

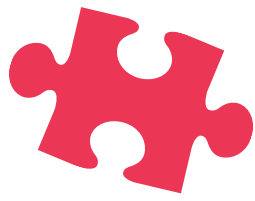

APRIL TEACHING CHALLENGE: JIGSAW



Purpose: Jigsaws have learners split into groups to learn specific content then mix to teach their peers what they learned. Jigsaws are designed to:

- promote collaborative work as each individual is an "expert" with only one piece of the puzzle. All learners are required to make the puzzle whole;
- teach multiple topics simultaneously during the same class session;
- deepen learning as learners work with other "experts" and explain material to "novices"; and
- motivate learners to accept responsibility for their own/collective learning.

"Jigsaw might be my all-time favorite teaching method. It provides a way to tackle big pieces of scholarship without students needing to read an entire book or multiple articles. It is so much more engaging for students than me lecturing to the room. Students have to take a stake in the learning and get actively involved." -Dr. Wieck, History professor, St. Mary's University

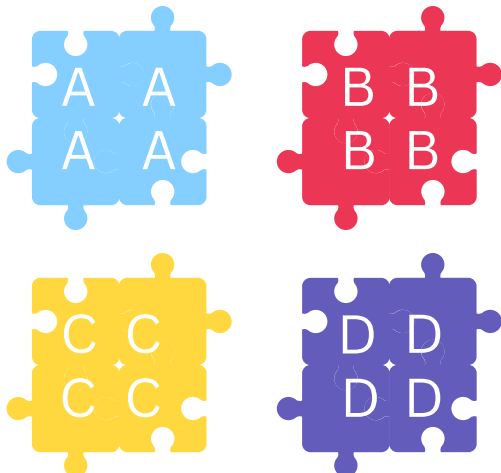
Procedure:

1. Cluster learners into Round 1 Expert Jigsaw groups.
2. In this Round 1 Expert groups, members read their assigned material (which differs for each group). They converse about its meaning, and determine what ideas they will teach and how (i.e., illustrations, graphs, charts).
3. Count off learners or categorize (letters, shapes) in each Round 1 Expert group.
4. Have all the number 1s, 2s, 3s, or all the As, Bs, Cs, and so on move into Round 2 Teaching groups.
5. Each "Expert" from Round 1 teaches the material to other members and leads part of the discussion in the Teaching groups.
6. Have the class reflect on the group discoveries in a debriefing session.

PRO TIP: Provide prompts for Expert group conversations.

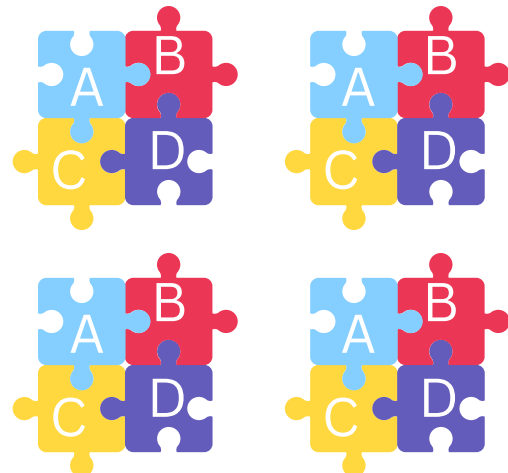
Round 1: Expert Groups

Divide students into groups and give each group a different text or a different concept to learn.



Round 2: Teaching Groups

Mix the groups up so each student can teach what they encountered in the first round.

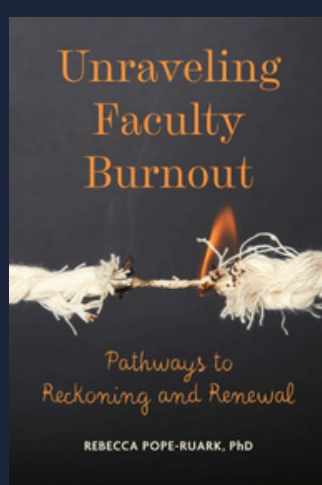
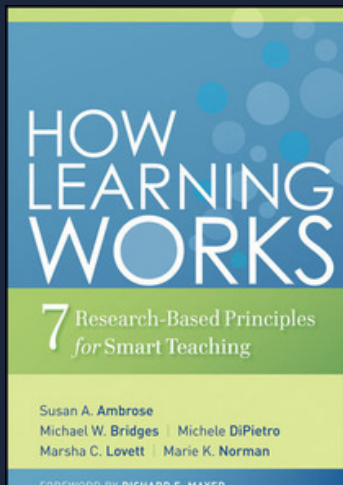
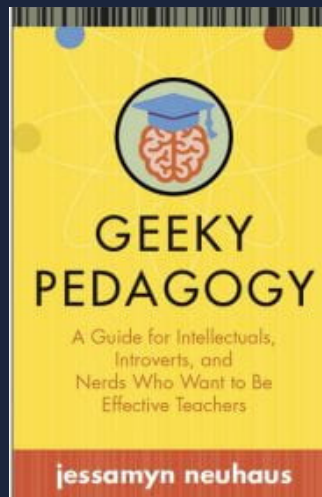
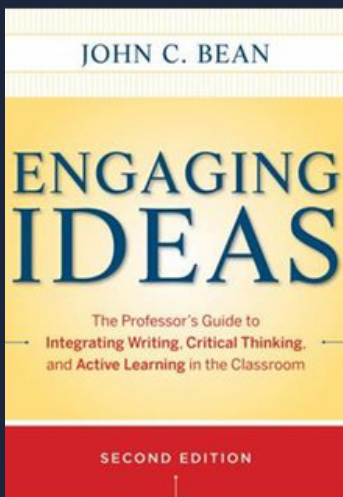
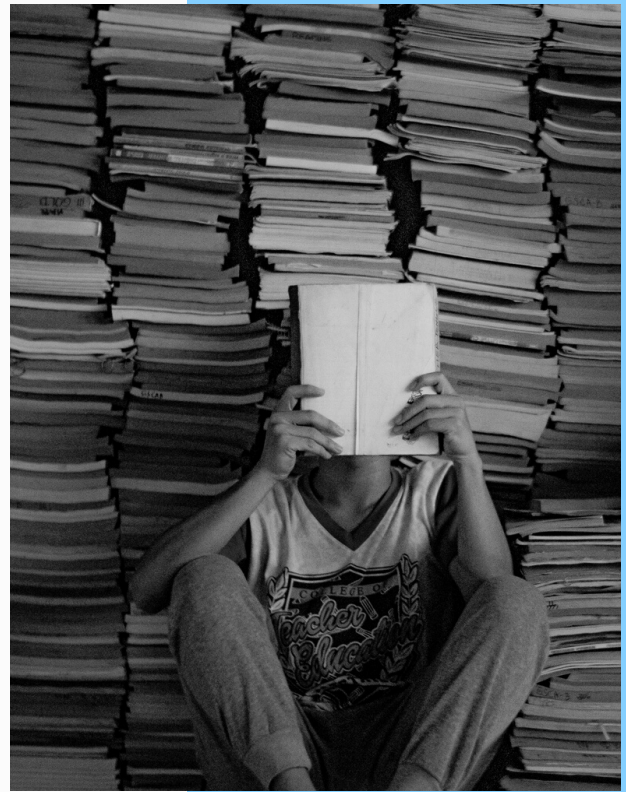
