Community-Engaged Work

A small group of Bates retired and retiring is working with Brunswick-based College Guild to examine research that evaluates the impact of prison education programs on learners. Providing nontraditional correspondence courses to prisoners across the U.S., College Guild seeks to assess the broad impact of its work as it designs future programming. The Bates group is investigating questions about how learning affects neuroplasticity, psychosocial health, and social interactions of folks incarcerated.




