Dance for Peace was a fundraising project shown to the community in Wellesley, Massachusetts, and consisted of multiple pieces that described stories of people affected by the war in Ukraine. Its goal is to provide space in the arts for voices whose lives have been affected by war conflicts and all the horrors they can bear in life. Through multi-genre pieces, we seek to reject the militarized and dis individualized approach conveyed by the international media to the description of people affected by war. Instead, we strive to concentrate on individuals' mental state and emotions. Humility with the loss of loved ones. The bitterness of loss and grief. The trauma left by the war. Throughout the choreography, we describe the stories of real Ukrainians whose lives were affected by the invasion. The dances seek to convey both the darkness of these emotions and the hope for the light of the future.

The below description and work depict images of violence (pantomimed guns and shooting). We have built-in 2 mins before and after this work to allow audience members to exit and reenter the theater space at their discretion.

The Merriam-Webster Dictionary defines "Pareidolia" as "the tendency to perceive a specific, often meaningful image in a random or ambiguous visual pattern".

The creation of "Pareidolia" built off of the ideas I explored in my independent study from the 2022 Marcy Plavin Fall Dance Concert, titled "To/Two/Too". Both of my creative processes looked at the use of movement as an expressive tool that can be interpreted differently by choreographers, dancers, and audience members. More specifically, my thesis considers how movement can provide a platform for individual self-expression while also bringing individuals together through moving in unity and using movement as a form of communication between one another. My cast and I talked about how movements can appear differently on each of us, which then led us to reflect on the unique histories of our bodies and how we each have the ability to share a different story through dancing.
